Knowledge Understanding:

- understand and describe the Christian vision of the human person

- develop critical thinking skills through a consideration of the theoretical, legal and practical aspects of bioethical decision-making

- discuss the different models of moral reasoning leading to different clinical judgments
- critically assess the moral arguments used to justify biomedical and biotechnological developments

- apply moral theory to real-world bioethical problems
