Very recently, the Group lost someone who although never wore a Scout uniform, was always considered by our members as a full member of the Group. This was Nenu as we all know him, who was the brother of the former Group Scout Leader Mr Joe Grech (Skip). I have known Nenu since I was a Cub in the early sixties. Nenu was always at headquarters (which at that time was) in Ghajn Qatet Street in Victoria. This place which served as the Group's headquarters for its first 27 years belonged to his family. Even during these last years, Nenu used to visit us regularly when he used to come to headquarters and attend all group activities with his brother. At his funeral the whole group paid its respects in full by attending mass, provided a Guard of Honour and also some of the leaders acted as pallbearers.

In summer 2019, the next World Scout Jamboree will be held in North America and the preparations have already started. I am pleased to inform you that our Group is going to be represented by a contingent of 16 members, 12 Scouts and Venture Scouts and 4 leaders. This is the biggest number from our group ever to attend a World Scout Jamboree. The first time that our group was represented in a Jamboree was in 1975 in Norway and then the only two Scouts from Malta attending this Jamboree were from our Group. Since then, our Group was always represented during each Jamboree, except for one time, (December 1987 - January 1988) when the Jamboree was held in Australia. This time the trip and the Jamboree fees amount to around €3000 for each participant and the Group Council has decided to help our members by donating all the proceeds from next year's fundraising activities.

Point to Ponder with the Editor

We will do our best!

These words are very familiar with Scouts wherever they may be. All Scouts should strive to live up to this statement. And these are a few recent examples where Scouts put this into practice:

• **Turkey:** Ever since the war in Syria started, Turkey has been welcoming large numbers of refugees, many of whom continue to stay in refugee camps in the southern border region of the country. The Scouting and Guiding Federation of Turkey (TİF, Türkiye İzçilik Federasyonu, WOSM's National Scout Organisation in Turkey) estimates that among the many children and young people living in refugee camps are some 4500 Syrian Scouts. In each of these camps, the Federation has helped open Scout Groups, has trained leaders and encouraged children and young people to join the groups where they can benefit from a variety of the Scout Programme activities. This participation provides a welcome break in the otherwise monotone routine in the refugee camps and helps the young people forget the atrocities of war in their home country.

• **Kenya:** AVSI Foundation Kenya in collaboration with the Kenya Scouts Association is implementing a Scout project in the Dadaab Refugee Camp - the world's largest refugee camp - for the young refugees and the host community in primary and secondary schools. This is the first of its kind in the region which has been in the news for the increase of terror attacks by Al-Shabbab terror group from Somalia. The group is said to thrive on religious radicalization of the youths by enlisting idle and jobless youths and offering them some form of engagement through training and indoctrination. To counter such thinking, Scouting for boys and girls in all the 5 refugee camps in Dadaab and its environs has been introduced. Its objective to provide these young people with life-skills and knowledge and steer them away from indoctrination programmes.

• **Madagascar:** Madagascar was hit by the cyclone ENAWO, the strongest ever recorded in the past 10 years. This natural disaster caused considerable damage. It destroyed many buildings and left people homeless.

Food crops were swept away by torrential rains. Once the water levels abated, Scout and Guide groups in the town of Antalaha in northern Madagascar came to the rescue, by cleaning the streets of these cities.

• **USA:** Approximately 55,000 Cub Scouts and Boy Scouts throughout Utah participated in the initiative Scouting for Food, with the Utah National Guard offering logistical support. Scouts were encouraged to fill a bag with nutritious non-perishable food donations, then leave it on their porch by 9:00 a.m. on March 18 2017. Last year, Scouting for Food collected close to 1.3 million pounds of food across the state, in addition to almost \$10,000 which was enough to provide over 1 million meals for Utahns statewide. Since 2010, the food drive has provided the equivalent of approximately 9 million meals state-wide. Well done indeed!

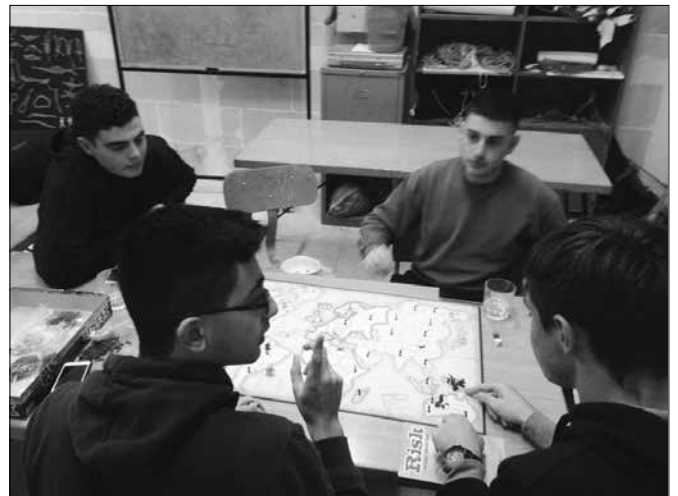
20 pizzas, with the other Group leaders being offered a slice as well. This served both as a team building activity and as an icebreaker, helping the new members get to know other Unit members better.

GOST FIL-BERAH - A weekend-long event with a number of activities aimed at providing an educational outdoor experience to children and youths in Gozo.

This was the idea behind the event organised by the Victoria and Xaghra Scout Groups through a grant offered by the Ministry for Gozo through the NGO Assistance Scheme, which grant facilitates the realisation of small projects, activities and initiatives on the island of Gozo by Voluntary Organisations during 2017. The funds granted were used to buy the necessary equipment in order to be able to offer the best experience in a safe environment.

The planning phases started way back in August with the application process, the subsequent approval of our project and the allocation of the funds. Numerous meetings between the two groups were held and a list of interesting activities was planned. Schools in Gozo, other NGOs, youth centres etc., were informed of the event and posters, e-mails and different social media were used for publicity.

Originally planned for the 11th and 12th of November 2017, the event had to be postponed due to inclement weather conditions. The event was then held on the 18th and 19th of November.

Three tents were set up at the Dwejra Camp Site. One was used as a kitchen while the other two tents served as the base for a number of workshops. Participants, both Scouts and non-Scouts, started their journey at the registration desk where they had the option of choosing up to 4, hour-long activities, out of the 8 which were being offered. The activities included archery, a zip-line across the valley, nature walks, craft sessions using recycled materials, rope work, fun games, instructions on how to use an axe, food preparation, cooking from scratch and lighting a fire. The same activities were offered both on Saturday afternoon and

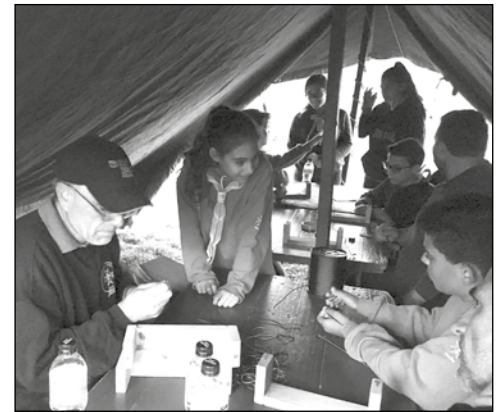


on Sunday morning. Scout leaders, Venture and Rover Scouts from both groups manned these stations.

A sleepover was held at headquarters at the end of October. Lots of games, a campfire, a film show, good food and a special wakeup call made this an evening, a night and a morning to remember.



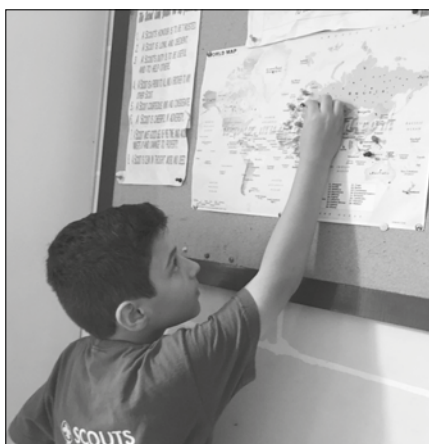

The World Scout Jamboree - **ADVENTURE AWAITS**

The 24th World Scout Jamboree will be held at the Summit Bechtel Family National Scout Reserve from July 22nd to August 2nd 2019. The hosting duties will be split between the Boy Scouts of America, Scouts Canada, and Asociación de Scouts de México.

The Summit Bechtel Reserve is located in West Virginia, USA, and is comprised of more than 14,000 acres (5,667 ha) of beautiful forested mountains adjacent to more than 70,000 acres (28,328 ha) of national park in the scenic New River Gorge area of West Virginia. The Summit Bechtel Reserve is one of the most environmentally sustainable human habitats ever built for Scouts.

The theme, Unlock a New World, invites participants to unlock new adventures, new cultures, and new friendships. The theme was originally designed by youth representatives from the three host countries, also known as the "Dream Team," who was responsible for presenting the original bid for the 24th World Scout Jamboree. That theme has been carried forward by the next generation of youth representatives, "Dream Team Two." Whether one attends as one of the 30,000 participants, or joins the staff of 10,000 as part of the International Service Team or Contingent Management Teams, each is invited to unlock a world of opportunities.

Rovering provides enjoyable activities that combine personal development with meaningful service. Baden-Powell called it a "brotherhood of open air and service".

The objectives of Rovering are to:

- Provide service to the Scout Movement
- Provide service to the community
- Develop as individuals by expanding one's range of skills
- Enjoy fellowship, social, outdoor, and cultural activities

The World Organisation of the Scout Movement will be celebrating this important anniversary by holding various activities worldwide.
