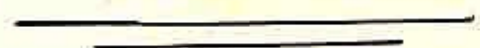

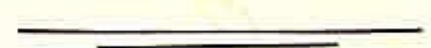

D. A. A. Carrara (the new Director) presided. Professor G. Corles opened the Ceremony by delivering an address on <sup>"Il periodo degli studi di maggior importanza è il letterario"</sup> His Excellency the Governor, then, distributed the Prizes and Medals to the following Students who had distinguished themselves at the Public Annual Examinations held in July last. After which His Excellency addressed the audience in an appropriate speech <sup>for Emigration</sup> in the course of which he was pleased to express himself fully satisfied with the work by the late Director Mr. Savona during his directorship, and trusted that the newly appointed Director with the assistance of the Senate would continue to promote the progress of Education.

SPEECH DELIVERED BY H.E. THE GOVERNOR ON 1st. OCTOBER  
1923, ON THE OCCASION OF THE PRESENTATION OF MATRI-  
CULATION CERTIFICATES.

---

I beg to thank Prof. Mellia for the address he has just given. I regret <sup>that</sup> I was unable to follow closely all that he said, but I know enough to be able to thoroughly endorse the advice and ~~which~~ <sup>council</sup> which he gave and I trust that you will follow them.

The Rector asked me to make a special effort to come here this morning because, as he said, it might possibly be the last time on which I should have the opportunity of addressing the members of the University. That being so, it appears to me that the way that I can best utilise the occasion is not by expressing my views on educational matters generally, nor on the educational problems and difficulties peculiar to Malta, nor on matters connected with the administration of the University, but by saying a few words especially to the students. But although my remarks are addressed to them specially, I hope that some of the ~~older~~ <sup>older</sup> men present may endorse what I am going to say and follow it up not only by precept but also by example.

Some four years ago this University did me the great honour of conferring on me an honorary degree. On that occasion I spoke to the students on the importance of Leadership; of the value to them of making it their objective in life and of the qualifications necessary for them to attain it. At that time, as you will readily understand, I had in my mind the very stirring events in which I had recently participated. Those events called continuously and with great persistency for Leadership and the claims for it were very ruthlessly tested and were either gratefully acknowledged and accepted or very unceremoniously rejected. Those events deeply impressed me, and not only me but also older men occupying similar positions, with the enormous value it would be to any nation who could possess among its people young men who had acquired or were developing the powers of Leadership. Nearly four years have elapsed since then -- years which will probably be described in official

histories as years of peace, but which to most of us, I think, can hardly seem to have been very peaceful ones. In any case those four years have only emphasised in my mind the impression of the importance of the young men acquiring Leadership; and that is the ~~subject~~ subject which I am again going to talk to you about for a few minutes this morning. I will try and speak in very simple language but I hope that the language will be plain. My undertaking, I know, is one of the most difficult tasks which a man of my age can attempt, and that is to try and say to a body of very young men something which they will remember and which will be of value to them. Now, what do I mean by a Leader? I mean a man whose advice and ~~is~~<sup>counsel</sup> is sought by others and acted on, ~~as~~ a man who influences others for good, not so much by ~~precept~~<sup>as</sup> precept ~~as~~ by example. Leadership of that kind is applicable to all walks of life. We require Leaders of that kind and should have them, everywhere --in the Church, in the Courts, in the Hospitals, in the Offices, in the Class-Rooms, in the Workshops, in the playing-grounds and in the home. Leadership in those places is open to all. But how can a young man acquire the qualifications for Leadership? I will answer first of all in one word: "by service". You may ask: what kind of service do you mean? I mean real service. I mean the service which the Church teaches: service first of all to God and then service to our fellowmen. Is there any special inherent quality required for such service? There is one thing which is essential --a man must be absolutely truthful, absolutely honest and absolutely upright. No man's services are of any value if he cannot be trusted. No man will follow any leader if he cannot trust him. The first step is to acquire a lesson which is the most difficult lesson for any young man to learn; older men have had to learn it sooner or later, but for a young man it is very difficult. He has to realise that he knows next to nothing and that he is worth next to nothing. If he really accepts that as an absolute truth, the next step for him is an obvious and easy one. It is by study, by application, by work to try to know a little

more, <sup>and thus be worth a little more.</sup> And what do I mean by "worth"? I mean the value of the service not to himself but to others. If you act on those principles, you need not put forward any claims to Leadership, you need not try to influence others, you will find that the others whom you have helped will come to you for advice and counsel; they will refer to you, they will quote you, and will take you as their example, and you will find yourself placed on a small pedestal; and then will come the second <sup>and</sup> crucial test: whether you are big enough to resist the temptation to use the small influence that you have acquired and which has placed you on that pedestal for your own advantage and not for the advantage of others. If you succumb to that temptation, your power will be very shortlived. You will realise that the pedestal on which you have found yourself is on very slender supports; they will crumble away and you will fall, and when you have fallen no one will be very much concerned as to what becomes of you. But if you resist the temptation and go on in the lines of making your service and your powers and influence valuable to others, then you will be a leader. A man who acts on those lines, may not have his name in large capitals in the public press; his photograph may not be in the picture papers; but he is a man his countrymen will look to and look up to, and any nation which has a number of men of that kind, especially if they are in the prime of life, is very fortunate. And what is the reward for the man? The reward is the best he can ask for or desire: it is the knowledge that his fellow countrymen have benefited by his work and by his services and <sup>that</sup> they acknowledge and appreciate them. We all of us in the autumn of our days realise that "service is the essence of life". It all depends how the Spring and the Summer have been spent, whether that knowledge when it comes to us, is sweet or bitter. I have tried to put before you the road to Leadership; it is not particularly easy, but it is not extraordinarily difficult: it is open to all: it is worth following. (Loud Cheers).

In proceeding to reform the church the Academic Body passed provisionally out of the Lyceum door by strada Mercanti's street.

YOUR EXCELLENCY,

We the Members of the University of Malta are here assembled to-day to bid farewell to our Visitor on the point of relinquishing the Governorship of these Islands.

Your Excellency has always supported the legitimate claims of this Institution (*hear, hear*). When in 1919 the University of Malta had the honour of admitting you among her sons, as a Doctor of Laws, the authorities wished to bestow the greatest gift in their keeping on the Governor who whilst using his great authority with moderation employed lavishly his talents and his kindness to improve the condition of the people. (*loud applause*).

As Rector I must acknowledge that besides the official help, at all times extended to this Institution, the instances of unofficial benevolence shown to the teaching staff and to the Students by Your Excellency, are not easy to number.

It is hard to say farewell to a chief who is also a benefactor, but as we have to do it we can assure Your Excellency that we put our whole heart in it, for we trust that your benevolence towards the University will not be diminished by mere distance.

On our part we are sure that Your Excellency's name will live for ever in our memory and we shall earnestly pray that Your Excellency and Lady Plumer may, for the rest of your lives, enjoy the great happiness you so richly deserve. (*loud applause*).

Mr. A. F. Sciortino, the Secretary, then read the following Resolution:

That in these circumstances, the General Council desire to place on record their high appreciation of the interest His Excellency has always taken in this University. His Excellency's name will always be associated with the history of this University as that of one of its distinguished graduates through whose good offices it enjoys a Rhodes Scholarship granted by the University of Oxford;

That the Council in bidding His Excellency God speed, assure him that all the Members of the University will follow his future career with constant interest; and

That a copy of this resolution, signed by all the Members of the General Council, be forwarded to His Excellency the Visitor.

Amidst loud applause, a copy of the Resolution, on parchment, surmounted by the University coat-of-arms beautifully painted in colours, was handed to His Excellency.

Lord Plumer, in reply, delivered an eloquent and impressive speech, of which we regret we can only give a summary.

His Excellency began by expressing his warmest thanks for the very kind expressions

used in his regard both in the Rector's address and in the Resolution of the General Council. It was a great relief to him to think that as far as the University was concerned his departure would not sever his connexion with the Institution, as it had done him the honour of conferring an honorary degree upon him— (*applause*) and that was to him a matter not only of gratification but of pride. Every civilized country regarded a University as an important factor in its national life, and for very good reasons, because a University education and degree meant not only that the person concerned had shown efficiency in the subjects required for the obtainment of such degree but also that he had received training in a corporate body. University training qualified for leadership and that was why in practically every country the leaders of men were those who hailed from the Universities. As he had already stated, even after leaving Malta he would still remain tied to the University—he could not sever the connexion if he would, he would not if he could. (*loud applause*). But as the time had come for him to bid a reluctant good-bye to the Members of the Institution, he wished to give them a farewell message, and it was this. He bade all those connected with the University, whether as Professors or as Students, in the past as in the present, to if not altogether remove, at least minimize the disadvantages under which it suffered in comparison with kindred institutions in other countries. The best way to do that was to instil into its Members and all connected with it the feeling known as *esprit de corps* (*applause*). It was a great mistake to think that such a spirit applied only to the Military. It was no more a military spirit because of the word "*corps*" than it was exclusively applicable to the French because the expression is in French. (*laughter*). *Esprit de corps* was a great thing; it was the spirit that urged and enabled the Members of a corporate body to pull together for the common good, for the good of the Body itself. Without it there was hardly anything that could be achieved, with it there was hardly anything that could not be accomplished (*applause*).
