**Ivan Callus** is Professor of English at the University of Malta, where he teaches courses in contemporary literature and in literary criticism. He has published widely in the areas of contemporary fiction, comparative literature, literary theory and posthumanism. His most recent volume (co-edited) is *European Posthumanism* (Routledge, 2016). Other co-edited volumes include *Discipline and Practice: The (Ir)resistibility of Theory* (Bucknell University Press, 2004); *Post-Theory/Culture/Criticism* (Rodopi, 2004); *Cy-Borges: Memories of Posthumanism in the Work of Jorge Luis Borges* (Bucknell University Press, 2009); *Posthumanist Shakespeares* (Palgrave Macmillan, 2012) and *Style in Theory: Between Literature and Philosophy* (Bloomsbury Academic, 2013).
