## Maltese Shooters Under Royal Attack

The Royal state visit to Malta of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and the Duke of Edinburgh brought a nasty surprise for Maltese shooters.

The Duke, who is president of the World Wide Fund for Nature urged Maltese leaders to take action on the shooting and trapping of protected species of birds in and out of the migratory season.

MOS president Mr Joe Doublet was received by Her Majesty and the Duke aboard the Royal Yacht Britannia on the 29th of May.

## MOS News

June 3rd: Mr Joe Doublet and Mr Paul Portelli (President and Director of MOS respectively) met the leader of the Opposition Dr Alfred Sant and Dr Joe Cilia to discuss bird protection. Dr Sant agreed with MOS on the need for better bird protection legislation and law enforcement.

June 4th: MOS officials met Dr Stanley Zammit (Parliamentary Secretary for the Environment) and Mr Censu Galea (Parliamentary Secretary in the Ministry for Social Security) at Is-Simar to discuss the new Nature Reserve.

June 6th: Mr Paul Portelli took a group of people from the San Blas Rehabilitation centre - run by Caritas - to Buskett gardens to observe nature. The tour was part of a three day seminar at Villa Psaigon. Such activities are of great importance to rehabilitate these people back into society.

There are unconfirmed reports that a tourist complex the size of Rabat will be built at San Martin (l/o St. Paul's Bay). This area of land is of great ecological importance. Malta's environmental groups: MOS, Arbor, SSCN and Moviment ghall- Ambjent have written to Mr Michael Falzon (Minister for the Environment) requesting details about the position of his ministry on the matter.

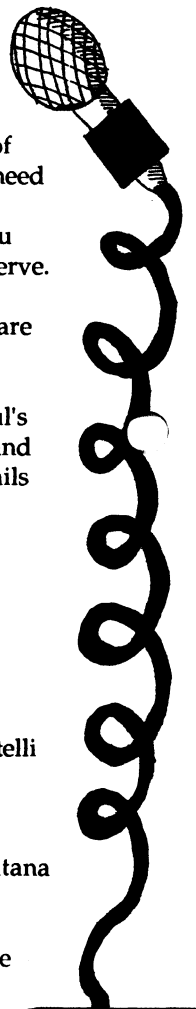
There are also rumours that the Ta'Cenc company would like to build an extension to the tourist complex at Ta'Cenc. Maltese environmental groups are against any such action as it would disrupt the ecosystem.

Alternativa Demokratika held a seminar on World Environment Day (5th June) to discuss environmental problems. Mr Joe Doublet read a paper on "What is the future of hunting in our country?"

May 1992: Mr Paul Portelli - MOS Director attended the World Conference on Birds of Prey in Berlin. Mr Portelli gave a talk about shooting of birds of prey in Malta. The conference passed a resolution to ask the Maltese government to improve bird protection legislation and enforcement.

Mr Paul Portelli and Mr Joe Sultana represented MOS in Aachen, Germany at a conference of the European Continental Section of the International Council for Bird Preservation of which MOS forms a part. Mr Joe Sultana gave up his post as chairman of the above section but retained a seat on the executive committee.

Now that summer is here and migration is over the Ghadira Nature reserve is too hot for visitors. The reserve will be closed to the public until further notice.



## Looking for Something to do?

How about taking part in a scientific survey that will help birds? One of the aims of the Research Committee is to carry out studies which would eventually help bird conservation.

Activities are envisaged for the next year to try and map the distribution of some of the breeding birds, especially those, such as the Spectacled Warbler, whose populations have been noted to decrease. Volunteers are required. One

need not be an expert on birds. What is required is a will to help.

So please, write to the chairperson of the Research Committee informing him that you are willing to help in this much needed project. Further details will be given at a meeting for volunteers which will be held at a later date.

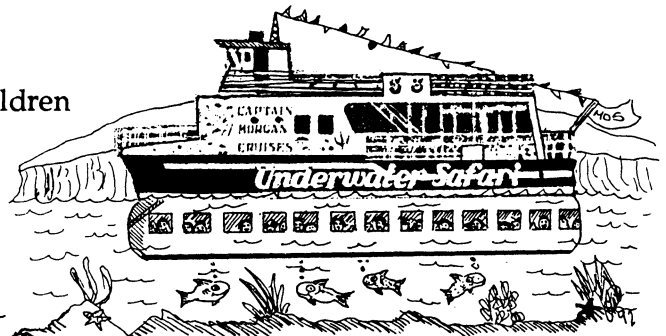
