


Majestic Migrants

Millions of birds undertake long journeys twice annually in the seasonal migration of birds - a fascinating natural phenomenon. Birds fly south in autumn to spend the winter in countries providing food and a milder climate, then return to their breeding quarters in the following spring. Many species are involved but few are as spectacular in flight as the birds of prey. These winged aristocrats are marvellous to watch. Some are able to soar and circle endlessly to great heights, using the warm rising air of land masses.

Unlike many other species, birds of prey are diurnal migrants and very often reach Maltese shores late in the afternoon. Those which arrive late in the day seek a roosting site to spend the night here (whether they succeed or not is another, different, sad story).

Although there are species such as harriers, and to a certain extent falcons, which do not hesitate to cross the Mediterranean Sea at its wide crossings, most of the birds of prey, such as the honey buzzard (kuċċarda) choose the shortest stretches of water. The birds that come to Malta look for a safe place to rest, a place full of trees and dense undercover...Buskett.



Structure Plan for Malta

PROTECTED ...*FINALLY*

Life is looking up for two families of Maltese animals - the reptiles and marine mammals. Laws have been passed which totally protect these animals. It is now illegal to interfere with the lives of any Maltese lizard, gecko, skink, sea turtle, snake, dolphin, whale, porpoise or seal. Endemic species such as the Maltese wall lizard (found nowhere in the world but the Maltese Islands and two other islets) should no longer have to worry about extinction. Chameleons should no longer be harassed and taken home in plastic bags or jam jars.


The law states clearly that:

No person shall pursue, take or attempt to take, kill or attempt to kill, possess, buy buy, sell, exchange, import, export any of the species listed in the schedule.

Any person who commits an offence will be charged Lm25 (first time) and Lm100 for every subsequent event - for each specimen involved.

These laws really are a step in the right direction. If these laws are enforced, the sight of turtles butchered for sale, crushed lizards and dead dolphins should become a thing of the past.

Government has moved to protect reptiles and marine mammals. It is meanwhile a shame that millions of birds are still shot every year. MOS expects that the bird protection laws are updated and enforced immediately.


