Wild bird trade - the facts



Every year millions of wild birds are trapped to be sold as pets. Europe alone takes one-and-a-half-million each year. The Wild Bird Trade is extremely profitable, parrots can be sold for thousands of pounds. If people in Europe stopped buying wild birds as pets the trade would collapse.

This trade must stop before more species are harmed, and not only the birds, but also their habitat. To reach rare (and

hence expensive) birds, trappers will often destroy the habitat. This savage destruction has pushed several species onto the brink of extinction. Once they are gone we will have lost them forever. Obviously, the rarer the bird, the greater the demand by aviculturists.

If you buy a parrot, check that it was bred in captivity - that way you will not be depleting the wild population. Captive bred birds will have a ring on their legs. If you are not sure, buy a budgie, canary or cockatiel as nearly all are bred in captivity.





The excavation works at Is-Simar are ready. The area will now be fenced to stop shooters from entering the Reserve. Tree planting will start as soon as the ground is wet enough for trees to survive without watering. We are pleased to inform you that as on Friday 11th September Is-Simar was officially declared a bird sanctuary. It is now illegal to shoot or trap birds at Is-Simar and within 500m of its perimeter.

A car belonging to Mr Manuel Mallia, an MOS member was shot at and extensively damaged whilst Mr Mallia was birdatching at Bahar-ic-Caghaq. MOS condemns such actions by trigger happy shooters.

The Education Committee is launching another Robin Campaign in schools. This year school children will be taught about bird tables and bird feeding.

An afforestation committee has been set up within the Ministry of Food, Agriculture and Fisheries. MOS is represented on this committee which has already decided to initiate an afforestation project at Manikata.

Ramla I-Hamra in Gozo was threatened by speculators. MOS joined forces with other environmental groups to protest against these speculators.

On the 28th and 29th November, MOS is holding a fund-raising ballet concert by the MaryJane and Ray Mamo Ballet School. Further details will be given in the next issue of Bird Talk. So please keep this date free.

Thanks to all our willing helpers MOS was able to raise over LM500 during the MOS Bird Week (31st Aug. to 5th Sept.). It's quite an experience especially when you know that your collecting is helping such a good cause. Thanks a lot to all collectors and donors.

Extinct...That word is horrifying to use when describing a animal. Everyone has heard of the tragic Dodo, the Great Auk, Passenger Pigeon, that became extinct in an age when extinction hit the headlines. Nowadays, we seem to take it forgranted. What of the Glaucous Macaw, Dusty Sparrow, Huia, Labrador Duck and countless other birds that have become extinct through man's madness.

For every one that has gone, there are ten more on the brink.

Mankind seems to be too egomaniacal to realise that the world does not belong to us. We are not the ultimate creation, animals were not created for our amusement.

Animals can become extinct for countless reasons (most of them induced by humans) but for many species the pet trade has brought about their demise. Parrots, lovebirds, parakeets, cockatoos have charmed us humans for years. So what do we do? We take them out of their home where they fly free amongst orchids and butterflies and, stuff them into a metal cage.

AIR MALTA ... carrying birds into extinction?

Members of the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds (RSPB) have been sending thousands of letters to international airlines asking them to stop transporting wild-caught birds.

Over 80 airlines from as far apart as Canada, Zimbabwe, Eire and Japan have agreed to impose bans. Air Malta do not - so far - have a total ban.

MOS has asked Air Malta to stop carrying birds caught in the wild. Air Malta replied that they do not carry birds in the CITES Convention (highly endangered species) but may carry other (endangered) species.

These "other" species might not be on the brink of extinction now but who knows what their position will be on ten years. Also, the percentage of birds that die enroute is staggering (sometimes 60%). A recent shipment was found to contain 1000 dead parrots. Air Malta should stop transporting all wild birds - now!


