IMPORTANT COASTAL & MARINE SEABIRDS SITES IN THE MEDITERRANEAN

MOS is about to produce another book as part of its awareness programme, regarding the importance of safeguarding important bird habitats.

This publication which is being made possible with the co-operation of Amoco Oil Mediterranean Co., highlights the importance of seabirds sites in the Mediterrean basin. It lists about 130 sites spread all over the Mediterranean countries, giving a brief description of the

localities, the various threats to the sites as well as the status of these important seabird colonies. The aim of the book is to inform governments and authorities of the various Mediterranean countries of these important areas.

The author, Mr Joe Sultana has co-written a number of books about birds and their environment, among which you will find "A NEW GUIDE TO THE BIRDS OF MALTA".

As from the previous issue, this newsletter will be printed on recycled, unbleached paper.


It is our small contribution towards the preservation of the important forests, It is also a contribution towards reducing the mountains of waste that are produced.
