European Birds on the decline

MOS has recently launched the latest BirdLife publication which treats the conservation status of various European bird species. This publication highlights the unfortunate note, that notwithstanding the strict Euro-pean legislation protecting birds and their habitats, the numbers of several

species are decreasing. The main reason being given is agricultural practices which are incompatible with nature. The second most important reason is the shooting of birds. This factor accounts for approximately 32% of the species in decline. A few copies of this publication will shortly be available at the MOS Nature Shop.

Siberian Rarity

A Dusky Warbler has been observed feeding at Ghadira Nature reserve.
The bird was spotted on two separate occasions at the reserve by the warden who also managed to ring it. The warbler is a small bird measuring just 11cm from bill to tail and lives in Siberia. Its freak apprearance has been duly commemorated by a prized entry in the list of birds of the Maltese Islands.

Caution - Men At Work!

Work at is-Simar Nature Reserve is progressing smoothly. Following the recent rains, MOS volunteers are busily planting trees along the embankments which surround the reserve. A variety of native trees such as pines, poplars and olives have been chosen to embellish the reserve and at the same time provide a safe resting place for migrating birds. You too can help in the

Unfortunately during the first week of December 1994 vandals broke into the reserve. They killed most of the waterfowl



which had gathered there over the previous weeks, and uprooted and destroyed a large number of freshly planted trees. Since then MOS volunteers have replanted more saplings to make up for the damage done.



Hunting Season Over

As from the first day of February, hunting and trapping would be prohibited until the coming autumn when the hunting season opens again on the first day of September. However, a short hunting period during the months of April and May may be allowed for, pending government's approval. MOS has strongly opposed this short spring hunting period because of its destructive effect on birds at the crucial breeding period. Last year's experience, being the first taste of the new Bird Protection Legisation, has shown that the indiscriminate slaughter of protected birds during spring leaves a serious flaw in legal protection of birds. This year MOS will lobby the government even further to implement a total ban on Spring shooting. In the meantime law enforcement has been showing positive results with a partial decrease in poaching. A peak of over 90 hunters have been booked for infringement of bird protection laws in just under a month. Your help is important in ensuring adequate bird protection: report any shooting incident after the first of February to the local police station or directly to the MOS office.

Conservation Exploration Competition

If you are an enterprising local conservationist, then this is good news for you: BirdLife International and the Fauna and Flora Preservation Society, with financial support from British Petroleum, hold an annual competition for conservation exploration projects. This conservation competition has been going on for several years now. Any proposed project must clearly address a conservation issue of international importance. The chosen project must fall within one of the following categories: Tropical Rainforest, Wetlands, Oceanic Islands & Marine, and Globally Threatened Species. The expedition must also involve local students or counterpart organisations and must have clearance from the host government. As all this will take a considerable amount of time to co-ordinate, applications are being considered for the next calendar year. Discussing your ideas with the MOS Director is essential before submitting your project proposals.
