

Power to the Killers



1980 First steps in the right direction. Close season introduced, various areas put out of bounds for hunting, birds of prey and breeding species largely protected. However, various loopholes render enforcement very difficult

1993 Major improvement, with the well-being of birds given priority. Close season extended, trapping (but not killing) banned in spring, list of species and protected areas extended. Most loopholes eliminated. Setting up of ALE helps situation.

1996 First rifts. Trapping in spring re-opened, some protected species put back on the hunting list.

1997 Shameful throwback to pre-1980 days. Open seasons extended on all fronts, close season reduced to a mere 10 days per year! More species for trappers to net. Loopholes re-installed with a vengeance.

So far... so bad!

30 January 1994

MLP deputy George Vella signs give-away agreement with hunters.

4 November 1996

BirdLife requests meeting with new environment minister George Vella. A three-month wait follows!

4 February 1997

BirdLife finally meets minister Vella to express disapproval of the 1994 agreement. Minister very fiery, talks of past promises, welcomes protests and hunger strikes!

7 February 1997

BirdLife writes protest letter to prime minister.

11 February 1997

BirdLife seeks support from the Ombudsman.

13 February 1997

Prime minister writes back, adopting much the same tone as minister Vella. The show must go on!

14 February 1997

The bomb explodes. Minister Vella meets hunters and police

authorities, gives green light for virtual year-round hunting holiday. Happy Valentine's Day, dear birds!

14 February 1997 (late at night)

BirdLife goes to court to try and stall the implementation of amendments. Court accepts to consider temporary ban on implementation.

17 February 1997

BirdLife in court. Legal battle between Counsel to BirdLife and Attorney General. Court finally rejects BirdLife's contention, saying we should have lodged our complaint *before* the amendments were published!

For the record

When BirdLife reps met minister Vella on 4 February, he challenged them to give him proof that hunting causes environmental damage.

Days later, he announced a rise in hunting licences. It's only right, he said, that one pays for - hold your breath - **environmental damage!**

Statute

With a better running of BirdLife in mind, the following changes to the statute are being proposed by Council for approval by the AGM.

- Council election should be called every other year, instead of every year. Council believes that a longer term of office will consolidate a member's contribution to BirdLife.
- There should be no limit to the number of times that a member may be elected to serve on Council. As the statute stands, a member can serve a maximum of 5 years in a run.
- The post of Chairperson of the Council is to be included in the list of Council members.

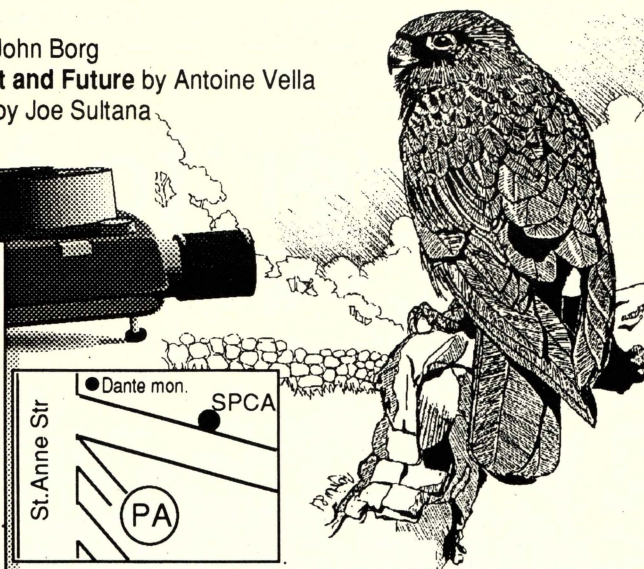

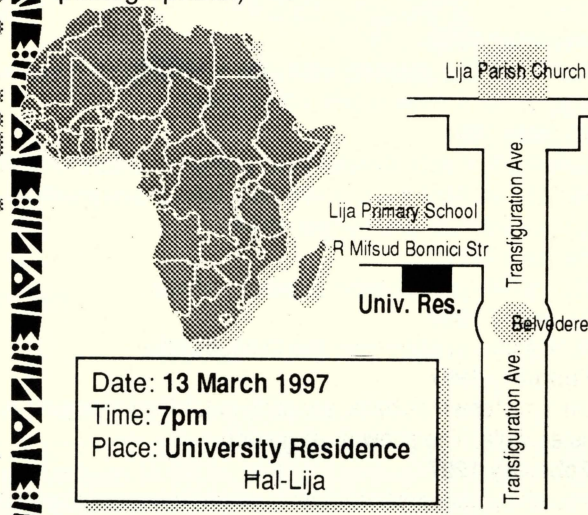

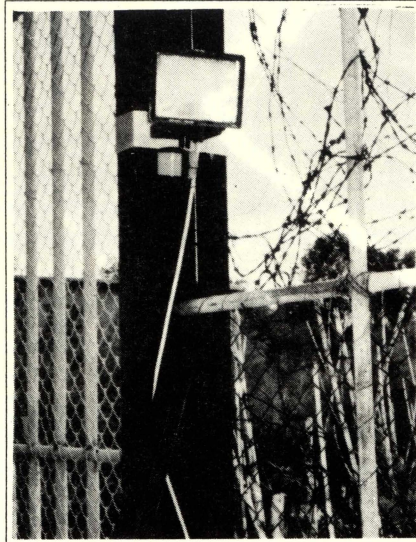
Matters of Great Reserves

- a **spoonbill**, making a spectacle of itself!
- two **cormorants**, sunning themselves!
- a pair of **pintails**, showing off!
- a few colourful **wigeons**, fully decked out in breeding plumage!
- plus the usual wintering **grebes** and **coots**!

Two attempts were made recently to break into the reserve. One attempt was foiled by the warden who noticed two shooters cutting the protective fence. The other break-in was made at night.

BirdLife volunteers are equipping the reserve with automatic security lights (right) around the perimeter of the reserve. Such a shame that a nature reserve in Malta must be protected like a secret military plant!

It is not encouraging to note that some Church activities actually promote the

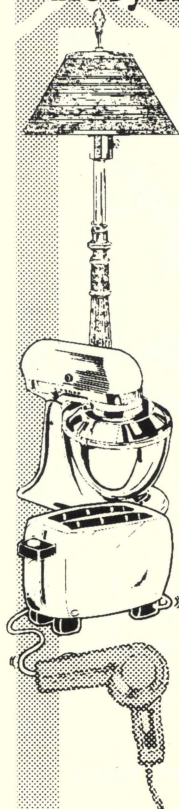

BirdLife urges Church authorities to condemn the wanton killing of birds as morally wrong.

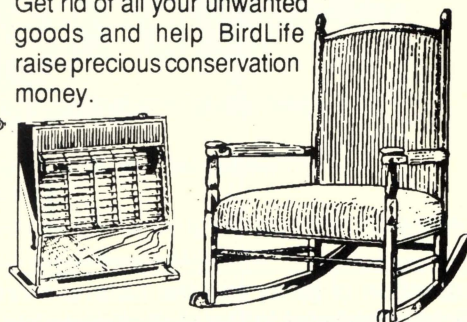
Recycling for Conservation

Hidden Singer

The **cryptic warbler** is a songbird recently discovered in Madagascar. It leads a very secretive life, which is why it has eluded naturalists for so long. A nature expedition observed this bird in its rainforest habitat, remnants of which are still present in Madagascar.

Russian Secret exposed

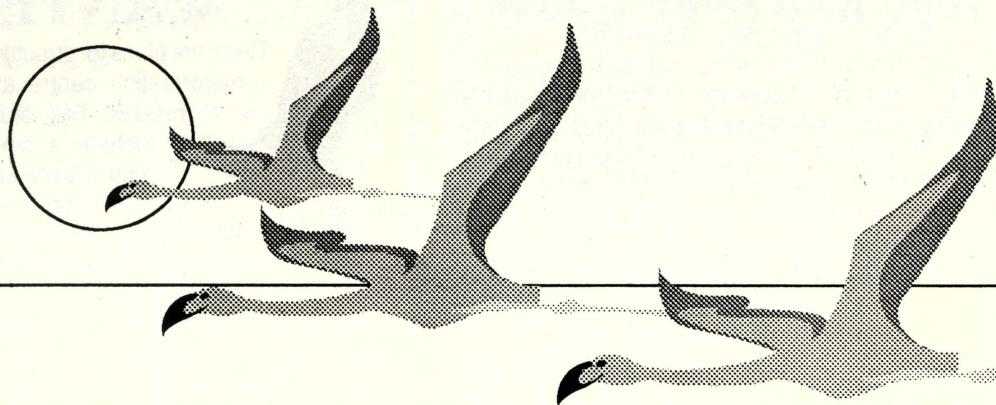
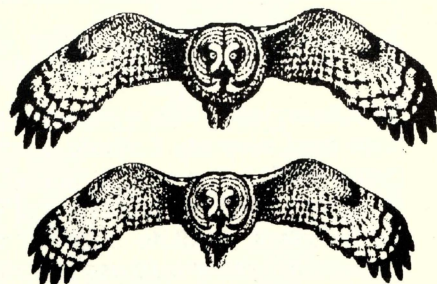
Four **Siberian cranes** were observed wintering in Bharatpur, a wetland haven in northern India. These are the first specimens to return to India since winter 1992/3. One bird carried a ring, which helped trace the bird's origins to the breeding grounds at Kunovat River in Siberia. This confirms that this western population is not (yet) extinct as has been feared.

Book of Plans

A total of 514 bird species regularly occur in Europe. Of these, **24 are threatened with impending global extinction**, that is, unless something is done very quickly to halt and reverse their decline. These species need tailor-made action, such as research into their habitat needs, strict protection and monitoring of specific nest sites, in extreme cases even the provision of food - some situations are *that* critical. All these measures are outlined for every species in a special Action Plans book published in October 1996 by BirdLife International. The Partnership hopes this publication will move governments to better protect these highly endangered species. Meanwhile, Malta protects migratory birds by extending the hunting season! Good, eh!
