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MaLIA Activities

Annual General Meeting

MaLIA held its Annual General Meeting at the University of Malta Library Boardroom on 22nd February 2011at 5.30pm. The meeting was chaired by MaLIA Hon. President Dr. Paul Xuereb.

The approval of the 2010 Annual General Meeting was followed by an open discussion based on matters arising from the Chairman's Annual Report. Issues brought up included:

- the Malta Libraries Bill tabled in Parliament by the Hon. Minister Dolores Cristina;
- MaLIA course for library workers at local councils;
- the matter of having a more centrally located Public Library;
- possibility of launching a scholarly journal and of having an online directory of libraries;
- warrants for librarians;
- restructuring at University of Malta with special reference to the setting up of a new Faculty of Media and Knowledge Sciences and the Department of Library Information and Archive Sciences and the introduction of full-time day courses leading to an Honours or General degree in Library and Archive Studies as from October 2011.

The Chairman's and Treasurer's Reports were followed by the election of members to serve on Council for a year commencing February 2011. [See front page of this Newsletter]



SAVE OUR LIBRARIES DAY

On Saturday, 5th February, libraries all over UK organised a number of events to protest at the threatened shutdown of 400 branches as a result of budget cuts. Events included read-ins, talks by authors and storytelling sessions. The campaign was given media coverage, including online publicity.

The Chartered Institute of Library and Information Professionals (CILIP) supported this day of action and drew up a set of actions for the Secretary of State for Culture, Jeremy Hunt. It also released a statement on the position of the public library service in England and made available on its website resources to support campaigning and advocacy. These included

STUDENTS PROTECT ALEXANDRIA LIBRARY

During recent unrest in Egypt, students protected the Alexandria Library by holding hands and forming a human shield around the building. Ismail Serageldin, who directs the library, claimed that not a single stone was thrown at the glass façade, stating that the population loves the library.

The new Bibliotheca Alexandrina, located roughly at the same site where the ancient library had stood, was opened in 2002. In less than ten years it has established itself as a gathering place for scientists, literary figures and thinkers from around the world. It comprises four museums, a planetarium, a children's science centre, a library for the blind and eight research institutes. The library also makes use of advanced information technology and houses one of the few archives in the world of every web page on the internet.

Serageldin was reported saying that the library was spreading the values of democracy, freedom of expression, tolerance, diversity and pluralism, which he hoped were taking root in the young generation. According to him, the library has proved to be a key tool in "a battle for the hearts and minds" of Egyptians.

LIBRARY OF CONGRESS OPENS GRAPHIC ARTS GALLERIES

On 18th March 2011, the Library of Congress opened Swann Gallery and the Herblock Gallery, two of three exhibition spaces within its new Graphic Arts Galleries. The third exhibition space is set to open in September 2011.

The galleries will feature cartoon collections, including caricatures, comic strips, political drawings, artwork designed for magazines and graphic novel illustrations. The Library of Congress has been collecting original cartoon art for over 140 years and is a major centre for cartoon research.

The librarian as guide to book choices

– letter by Laurence Zerafa, Chairman, Malta Library and Information Association, published in *The Times* on 11th February 2011.

A letter written in reaction to news item titled Form IV and V students should have access to banned local book (*The Times*, 4th February 2011). In his contribution, Laurence Zerafa outlined MaLIA's views on the matter of book selection in school libraries and the importance of having qualified librarians in schools, able to deal with such situations. This letter was written following the controversy over Mario Azzopardi's book *Vampir* which had been described as being "banned" from school libraries.

If the reader does not go to the library....

MaLIA Chairman, Laurence Zerafa, posted online comments on *timesofmalta.com* in reaction to Editorial titled *If the reader does not go to the library....* This editorial, published in *The Times* on 7th March 2011, acknowledged the importance of the book and the increase in membership at the Central Public Library, but highlighted a number of shortcomings at this institution and stressed the need of making "libraries more enticing while nurturing collections and strengthening the infrastructure".

In his reply, Laurence Zerafa expressed MaLIA's satisfaction that the editorial gave due importance to books and libraries and pointed out that over the years MaLIA has "lobbied for putting into place the essential ingredients that will attract people to use libraries and read", including:

- 1. A more central location.
- 2. More attractive modern premises.
- 3. Appropriate collections, equipment and services.
- 4. Suitably qualified and trained professional staff.
- 5. The right legal framework, librarian education and published library standards and
- 6. The right financial backing.

He concluded by stating that MaLIA was looking forward to the enactment of the new Libraries Act.

Malta Libraries Act

9th February 2011 — The Hon. Minister of Education, Employment and the Family, Dolores Cristina, introduced the second reading of the Malta Libraries Bill. Points raised included:

- Libraries to fall under the responsibility and management of the National Librarian
- The need of a legal deposit which included audiovisual and electronic media
- Malta Libraries to replace the Public Libraries Department
- New strategies needed to attract more people, especially children and youth, to read more

Speaking during the second reading of the Bill, the opposition spokesman on education, the Hon. Evarist Bartolo noted that:

- Library development was directly linked to the economic, social and cultural development of the country
- Reading and libraries remained important despite technological development
- There was a need for a national strategy about the diffusion of reading.

He also insisted that funds were crucial to the successful running of the sector and claimed that the sector was still starved of the necessary funding.



The launch was hosted by the National Archives Council and was addressed by the Hon. Minister of Education, Employment and the Family, the Hon. Dolores Cristina.

Changes to Notarial Archives Act

Parliament unanimously approved Bill which will make possible the removal of documents from the Notarial Archives for cultural, scientific or forensic use.

The Various Laws (Registry and Notarial Archives) Amendment Bill makes possible the temporary withdrawal of documents from the Notarial Archives, for not more than 20 days at a time, for cultural, scientific or forensic purposes.

Speaking during the presentation of the Bill, the Parliamentary Secretary, the Hon. Jason Azzopardi, stated it was government's intention to set up a national exhibition of historical records. He also paid tribute to volunteers on the Council for Research in the Notarial Archives for their dedication and work, including the classification, cataloguing and conservation of documents.

Library and Archive studies at University to undergo a change

A new Faculty of Media and Knowledge Science has recently replaced the Centre for Communication Technology (CCT) at the University of Malta. This development has resulted in the upgrading of the Division of Library and Information Studies, which fell under the CCT, to the Department of Library Information and Archive Sciences. The Dean of the new faculty is the Rev. Prof. Saviour Chircop while the Department of Library Information and Archive Sciences is headed by Dr. William Zammit.

These changes are set to affect library and archive studies at University. In fact, according to the Department's website, it is planned that the current part-time evening diploma courses in library and archive studies are to be "substituted by full-time day courses leading to an Honours or General degree in Library and Archive Studies as from October 2011".
