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So, what does a Librarian actually do?

This is a question that every librarian has been asked at some point or other. It is pretty obvious that librarianship is one of the most misunderstood professions, as many people have no idea what a Librarian does. The most common perception of a librarian is a stern-looking lady, with spectacles perched on the edge of her nose checking out books and warning patrons to keep silent. That however, is far from being a precise description of the whole picture.

Librarians fundamentally deal with information - the collection, organization, storage and retrieval of information. However, they come in many different forms. There are reference librarians, subject librarians, cataloguers, systems specialists, managers, school librarians and a host of other variations. Although the role of each varies, there is one common aim, and that is to help people find information. Some do it directly as in actually helping patrons with their queries, whilst others are hidden, such as those in the Acquisitions and Cataloguing departments.

Cataloguing for example demands concentration, precision and attention to detail. Basically, it is describing what something is and what it is about. Every item which has to become part of the Library's collection, including books, journals, CDs and DVDs needs to be catalogued as soon as it arrives. Different pieces of information need to be recorded for each item such as author, title, date of publication, number of pages, etc., That is fairly straightforward, but other items need more thought and research in order to achieve accuracy, such as finding the right keywords. *The better-described an item is, the more likely it will be that it can be retrieved by a library user through a catalogue search.* It is also important to follow international standards when entering data. *A semi-colon in the wrong place or a missing full stop can cause untold havoc in the cataloguing world!*

Then comes the **Classification** of items in which *we decide where in the library an item should be shelved, hopefully in such a way that it sits alongside items which deal with similar subject matter.* During classification we try to find the answer to the question '*What is this book about?*' The answer is not as straightforward as it seems though, as it is not always easy to narrow down the subject material contained into one particular classification.

That is a taste of just two of the activities carried out by Librarians. So besides the obvious tasks of putting books in order on the shelves, issuing books to people, collecting fines for items returned late etc., Librarians try to organise information as accurately as possible by adhering to codes and standards, in the hope that this will improve access to said information. 


Christmas in the Snow by Karen Swan (2014)



The Christmas Blessing by Donna VanLiere (2003)





The Story of my Life by Helen Keller (2011)





An **emoticon** etymologically a portmanteau of emotion and icon, is a metacommunicative pictorial representation of a facial expression that, in the absence of body language and prosody, serves to draw a receiver's attention to the tenor or temper of a sender's nominal non-verbal communication, changing and improving its interpretation. It expresses usually by means of punctuation marks, (though it can include numbers and letters) a person's feelings or mood, though as emoticons have become more popular, some devices have provided stylized pictures that do not use punctuation.

The word is a portmanteau word of the English words "emote" and "icon". In web forums, instant messengers and online games, text emoticons are often automatically replaced with small corresponding images, which came to be called "emoticons" as well. Emoticons for a smiley face :-) and sad face :-(appear in the first documented use in digital form. The use of emoticons can be traced back to the 19th century, and they were commonly used in casual and humorous writing. Digital forms of emoticons on the Internet were included in a proposal by Scott Fahlman of Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, in a message on 19 September 1982

Emoji are the ideograms or smileys used in Japanese electronic messages and web pages, that are spreading outside Japan. Originally meaning pictograph, the word emoji literally means "picture" (e) + "character" (moji). The characters are used much like ASCII emoticons or kaomoji, but a wider range is provided, and the icons are standardized and built into the handsets.

A large number of emoji exist in various genres, including facial expressions, common objects, places and types of weather, and animals. They are similar to but more comprehensive than previous dingbat fonts. The original designer of emoji, Shigetaka Kurita, took inspiration from weather forecasts that used symbols to show weather, and from manga that used stock symbols to express emotions, such as lightbulbs signifying inspiration. Some emoji are very specific to Japanese culture, such as a bowing businessman, a face wearing a face mask, a white flower used to denote "brilliant homework", or a group of emoji representing popular foods : ramen noodles, dango, onigiri, Japanese curry, and sushi.

Research Tip

What Information should I include when citing an information source?

Information for articles: author(s), title, source title, volume/issue, date, page range, URL (Web address) and date accessed if an online source.

Information for books: author(s)/editor(s), title(s), publisher, publisher location, date, and pages used.

Information for web page(s): author(s), title, last update date, date accessed, and URL (Web address).

What Citation Style to Use?

There are many different citation or documentation styles such as MLA, APA, and Chicago Manual of Style. Check with your instructor to determine which style you should use. Different areas of study (e.g., history, medicine, psychology) tend to use specific citation styles.

Is-Seħer tal-Letteratura

Kitba ta' Mario Cassar



Għandi domanda għalikom: Għala, aħna bħala għalliema, għandna ngħallmu l-letteratura? jew Għala l-istudenti għandhom jitgħallmu l-letteratura?

Meta nsaqsu din id-domanda, normalment u puntwalment jiġu f'moħħna żewġ tweġibiet li bħal donnhom jissodisfaw lil kulħadd. L-ewwel risposta: Il-letteratura hija sura ta' gost – u dak li jagħti gost fi valur. It-tieni risposta: Il-letteratura tgħallimna ħafna affarrijiet – u t-taqħlim fi valur. Kif jgħid tajjeb Orazju, l-arti (u għalda qasstant il-letteratura) kapaċi żżewweġ is-sabiħ mal-utli; u b'estensjoni t'hekk il-gost mat-taqħlim.

Is-sabiħ joħroġ mill-intervent artistiku tal-awtur. Dan jissawwar mill-forom espressivi li jagħżel: mill-unità tal-ħsieb u t-tema, mill-konsistenza tat-tonalità u l-burdata, mis-sens ta' bilanċ, mill-użu tal-kuntrasti, mill-komplessità tal-ideat, u fuq kollox mit-tħaddim ispirat tal-kelma. Din hija l-ewwel grazja tal-letteratura.

L-utli joħroġ min-natura nfiska tat-test. Il-letteratura titkellem essenjalment fuq l-esperjenza umana. Meta naqraw poežija jew rakkont, inkunu nixtiequ naqraw xi ħaġa fuqna nfusna – fuq il-fini tal-eżiżenza tagħna, fuq x-äħna naqħmlu hawn, fuq minn fejn ġejna u fuq fejn sejrin, fuq it-twemmin tagħna, fuq dak li nħossu u nġarrbu, fuq dak li jferraħna u jnifikitna, u l-kumplament. Letteratura li ma titkellimx fuq il-ħajja u fuq il-bniedem, fil-fatt, ma tinteressaniex. Il-letteratura tirrifletti l-ħajja; anzi għandha l-obbligu li tifoka fuq id-diversi aspetti tal-ħajja. Imma l-letteratura mhijiex sempliċiment mera tal-ħajja; hija wkoll lampa li tillumina l-ħajja; jiġifieri hija kapaċi tinterpretar l-ħajja. Il-letteratura ma titkellimx fuq il-ħajja b'mod astratt jew teoretiku bħalma tagħmel ħafna drabi l-filosofija, imma b'mod konkret u dirett. Din hija t-tieni grazja tal-letteratura.

Bin-nisġa ta' dawn iż-żewġ aspetti, l-utli u s-sabiħ, il-letteratura kapaċi tqanqal il-kuxjenza tagħna u ssinn is-sensi tagħna; b'hekk suppost tarrekxixi l-ħajja emozzjonali u intima tagħna. Fl-istess waqt, kapaċi tgħinna napprofondixu l-viżjoni tagħna billi tgħinna nifħmu x'inhu l-aktar bażiku u neċċessarju fil-ħajja, u tixprunana biex neżaminaw kontinwament dak li nħossu, nafu u anki nemmnu fi.

Ix-xettici jgħidulek: Hijha ħrafa (u allura għidba) li l-letteratura tista' ssalvalna ruħna jew li tista' tittrasforma f'nies aktar sensittivi u altruwisti. U probabbilment għandhom raġun! Fori t-tweġiba tiegħi sa tinhass pjuttost naive: Nitgħallmu l-letteratura għax għad għandna l-għażiex għall-esperjenza estetika, għall-maġjija tal-kelma, għal-dawk il-mumenti ta' illuminazzjoni li jgħibna wiċċi imb wiċċi mal-ġenjalitħ artistika. Kemm-il darba smajna nies jgħidu: "Kemm nixtieq li dan li qrajt ktibtu jien. Dawn l-affarrijiet dejjem kienu f'moħħi imma qatt ma kont kapaċi nesprimihom b'dal mod hekk meraviljuż." X'hemm allura wara l-ħila ta' test letterarju li b'mod straordinarju kapaċi jisseduċina? Kif jgħid Alexander Pope: "What oft thought but ne'er so well expressed". Mela forsi mhux id-dimensjoni filosofika, etika jew spiritwali tal-poeżi, in-novelli u r-rumanzi jiġiustifiaw l-istudju tal-letteratura imma l-faxxinu u l-misteru intrinsiku tal-istess xogħliji. Hawn forsi minn sa jakkuzani li qed nerġa' lura lejn l-idea ta' art for art's sake. U forsi għandu raġun. Is-sens tal-utli u d-dimensjoni edifikanti, kif rajna, ġew ikkōntestati bil-qawwi f'dawn l-aħħar ħamsin sena, imma s-sens tal-gost bħal donnu ħadd ma kellu l-ħila jkissru. It-tieni grazja tal-letteratura donnha ċediet taħt it-toqol tal-kritika kulturali ta' żminijietna, imma l-ewwel grazja bħal donnha baqqħet tirreżisti kull attakk. Ħafna tħal u studenti għadhom iħossu l-kilba li jiktib u jesprimu ruħħom; ħafna għadhom miġbūdin lejn is-seħer tal-att kreattiv; ħafna għadhom iħossu l-ħajra li jistudjaw il-letteratura anki f'livell universitarju. Mela anke jekk biċċa mužika, jew pittura, jew statwa, jew poeżi, jew storja mhux ħa jibdluk u mhux ħa jagħmluk bniedem aħjar minkejja s-seħer tagħfhom, xorta trid tismagħha, taraha, jew taqraha, għax bħall-għanja tas-sirena mitoloġika, il-ġibda lejn is-sabiħ tibqa' irreżistibbli.


Essay Punch is an interactive online essay-writing tutorial. It helps students organize thoughts and improve their essay skills.
