

The citation style for the MTL dissertation

A citation/referencing style is needed for any dissertation type. Your Supervisor may assign the citation style preferred by the Faculty of Education for your dissertation (such as the APA citation style). A citation style is a set of rules on how to cite sources, both in the body of your writing and at the end of your dissertation in the bibliography (where deemed necessary) and the references.

There are several citation styles and guides which are often published in an official handbook (in print and/or online) containing explanations, examples and instructions. The University of Malta offers RefWorks, which is one of the best citation managers available to date. It can also be integrated within Microsoft Word. Other software systems are equally accurate, if used with caution. This website may be helpful in determining which style you prefer: https://owl.purdue.edu/owl/research and citation/resources.

Choosing an appropriate citation style for your dissertation is important for two reasons. First, citation is crucial in academic writing because all academic work relies on a foundation of knowledge. Secondly, citation helps others locate your sources.

There is software which can be used to keep track of your citations but this is as accurate as the information inputted to it. Therefore, it recommended that students do not rely on software and the automated import of citations for devising references. It would be better to check their references and citations manually to ensure consistency of accuracy in the chosen citation style.

The use of footnotes in the text is allowed as a form of citation or to provide additional information without the distracting the reader from the main text.
